



# Maximising Impact through the Data Value Chain

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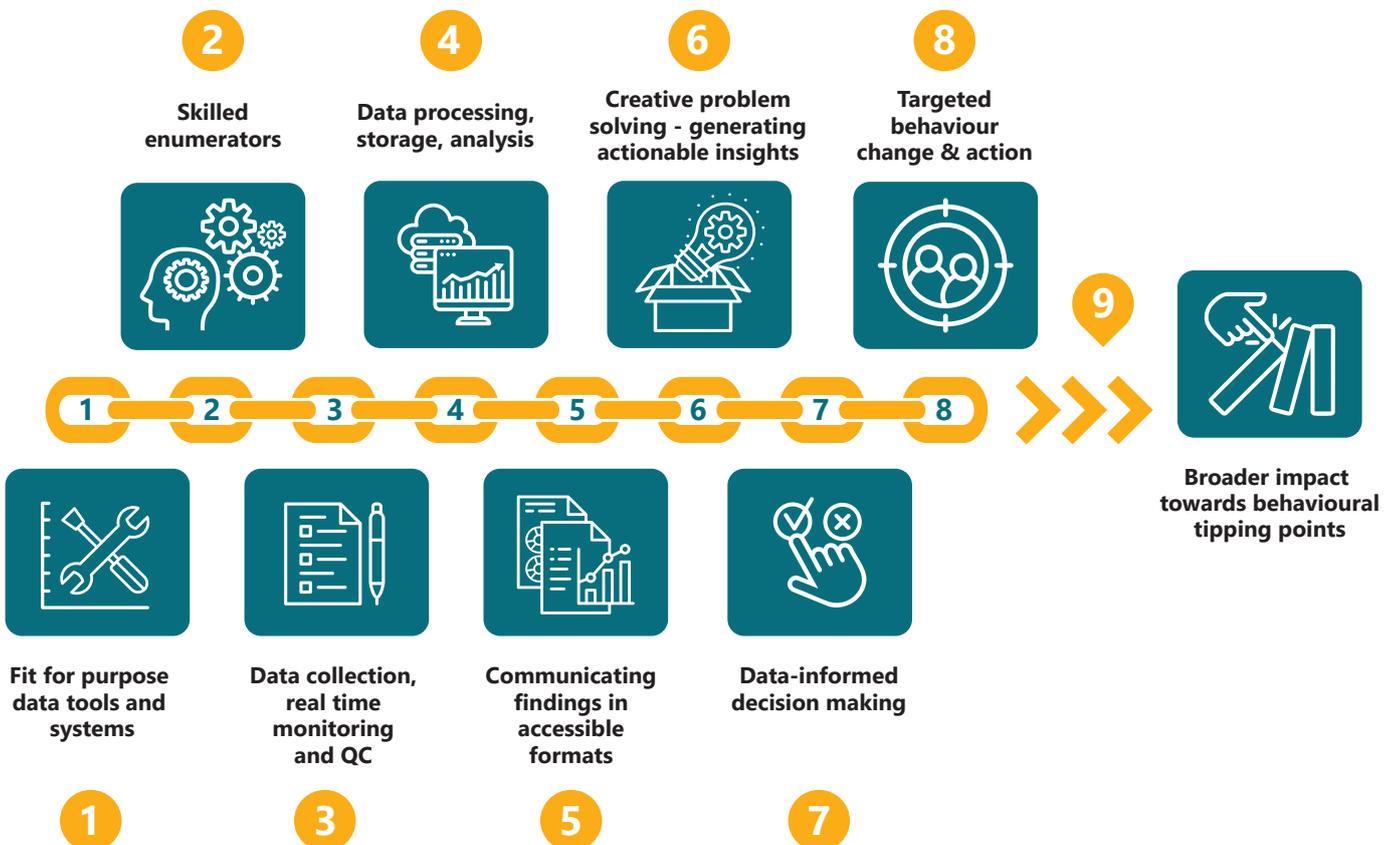
## Introduction

DataDrive2030 is a non-governmental organisation that leverages high-quality data to improve early childhood development in South Africa. The organisation's primary goal is to increase the proportion of children thriving by age five, leading to reduced educational disparities between children from affluent and poorer households by 2030. Since its inception in 2022, DataDrive2030 has focused on building tools and systems to collect and analyse data for actionable insights. This work spans the Early Childhood Development (ECD) ecosystem — from macro-level surveys to meso-level research and micro-level programme improvements.

DataDrive2030 has created a framework to organise and understand the journey from data collection to effective data utilisation - represented through the concept of the Data Value Chain. This brief provides a high level overview of the value chain and describes each of the nine components.

## The Data Value Chain

The Data Value Chain (illustrated below) outlines the journey from initial data collection to the eventual data-informed actions. Each step in the chain adds incremental value, considers context, and involves stakeholders with diverse skills and expertise — often spanning multiple sectors.



## 1 Fit-for-Purpose Data Tools and Systems

Effective data collection begins with user-centered tool development, where technical specialists collaborate closely with end-users to ensure relevance and utility. Tools must be psychometrically sound, contextually appropriate, and culturally sensitive, particularly within a diverse socio-economic and linguistic landscape.

DataDrive2030 develops and manages a suite of standardised and culturally fair assessment tools, designed for affordable use at scale within the South African context. The Early Learning Outcomes Measure (ELOM) suite of tools assess preschool and Grade R child outcomes across key developmental areas/domains and evaluates the quality of learning environments in both home and programme settings.

### *ELOM suite of tools:*

#### **4 & 5 YEARS ASSESSMENT TOOL**

Assesses the performance of children aged 50 to 69 months, in five important developmental domains.

#### **4 & 5 YEARS TARGETING TOOL**

Helps identify individual children aged 50 to 69 months who are falling far behind the expected standard and need additional support.

#### **ELOM-R ASSESSMENT TOOLS**

Includes the ELOM-R Mathematics Assessment Tool and the ELOM-R Language Assessment Tool. Evaluates early mathematics and early language in children at the end of their Grade R year or the start of the Grade 1 year.

#### **SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL RATING SCALE**

Assesses preschool children's social and emotional functioning.

#### **LEARNING PROGRAMME QUALITY ASSESSMENT TOOL**

Assesses the quality of group learning programmes targeting children aged 3 to 5 years.

#### **HOME LEARNING ENVIRONMENT TOOL**

Assesses the quality of the learning environment in the home for children aged 3 to 5 years.

By embedding the ELOM tools within an end-to-end data value chain, DataDrive2030 is democratising data by ensuring data tools and insights are accessible to users with varying levels of research expertise.

## **2 Skilled Enumerators**

The accuracy and integrity of collected data are strongly influenced by the skills and behaviours of enumerators. Rigorous recruitment protocols, comprehensive training, continuous professional development, structured form design with embedded logic and prompts, ongoing field-based support and immediate feedback loops are essential for minimising potential variance due to assessor-related factors. This is especially important for direct assessments involving young children from diverse backgrounds.

## **3 Data Collection, Real-Time Monitoring, and Quality Control**

Using technology improves the efficiency and cost-effectiveness of data collection and quality assurance processes. Real-time data monitoring through dashboards allows for immediate quality control and rapid course corrections. Resources such as guides, templates, and responsive helplines further augment data collection efforts and support users with little or no formal research training.

## **4 Data Processing, Storage, and Analysis**

Investment in robust backend infrastructure is vital for affordable use of assessment tools at scale. Built-in checks, consistent methodologies, and adherence to stringent ethical standards safeguard data integrity. By automating data cleaning, analysis, and reporting, DataDrive2030 has significantly reduced the costs traditionally associated with these tasks. These savings are passed on to users of the ELOM suite of tools. Sharing anonymised datasets via open-access platforms, like DataFirst (at the University of Cape Town), enhances transparency and promotes broader analytical engagement and trust.

## **5 Communicating Findings**

Communication strategies must transform complex data into compelling narratives tailored to diverse stakeholder needs. Effective dissemination requires clear messaging that highlights the practical relevance and implications of findings. This fosters motivation and accountability among all stakeholders, including data contributors.

## **6 Creative Problem-Solving**

Effective use of data requires moving beyond routine analysis towards innovative problem-solving. Bringing together diverse perspectives fosters novel solutions, challenges conventional approaches and promotes creative action based on solid evidence.

## 7 Data-Informed Decision-Making

For data to shape decisions, it must be trusted, understood, and seen as relevant. This requires investment in data literacy at all levels of decision-making. When people are confident in interpreting and using data, they are more likely to act on it. Demonstrating the real-world impact of data-informed choices (through case studies, for example) further builds trust and strengthens the role of data in future decision-making processes.

## 8 Targeted Behaviour Change

Data-driven insights alone do not guarantee behaviour change. Initiatives must clearly articulate motivations, simplify action pathways, and utilise social influences to reinforce and sustain desired behaviours. Addressing both psychological and practical barriers to change leads to more effective and sustainable practices and policies.

## 9 Broader Impact through Behavioural Tipping Points

When new behaviours are widely adopted, they can reach a critical mass, becoming societal norms through exponential spread. Mechanisms such as social networks, compelling messaging ("stickiness"), social validation ("social proof"), and environmental context play a critical role in driving behavioural change. The strategic influence of key individuals, often referred to as the "law of the few", also helps catalyse and sustain change at scale.

## Key Lessons and Insights

DataDrive2030's experience underscores the necessity of embedding robust data practices within an integrated value chain. Each stage, from data collection through to behaviour change, requires dedicated attention, resources, and cross-sector collaboration.

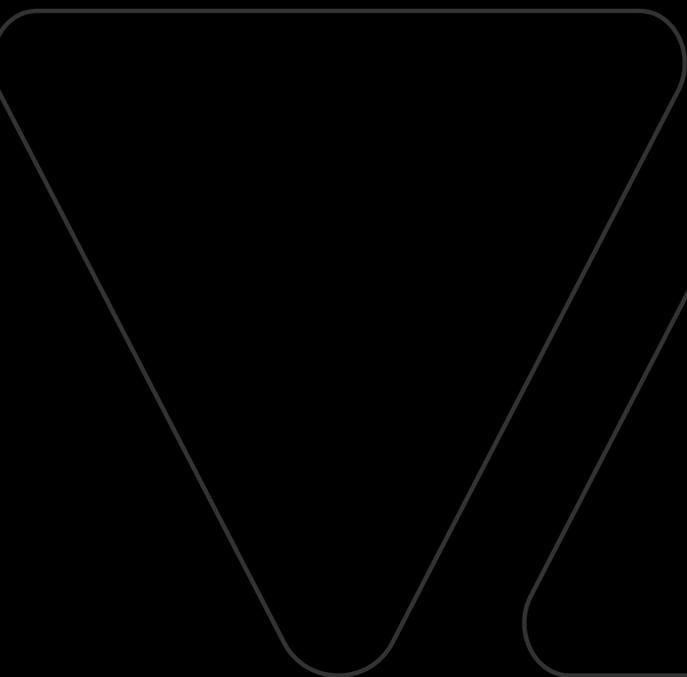
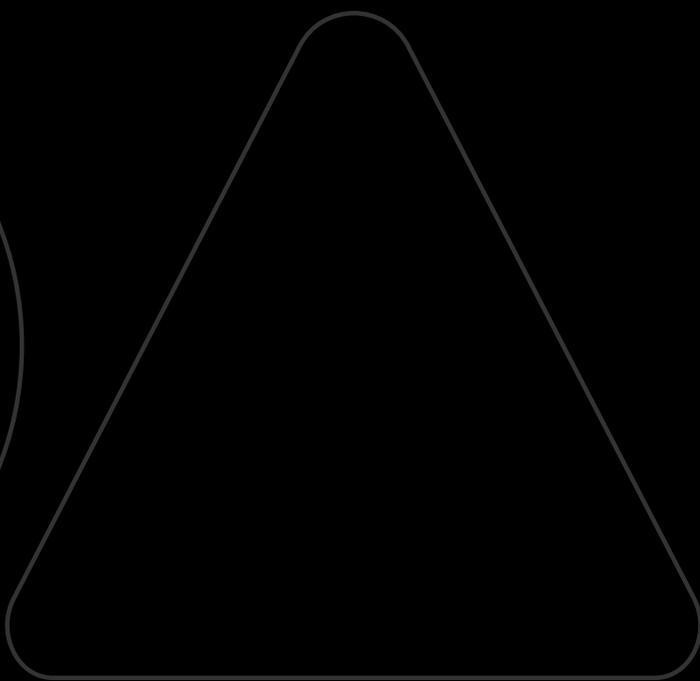
Three essential enablers further underpin the effectiveness of this approach: Money, Mandate, and Mindset.

- **Money:** Adequate investment across the entire data value chain and throughout the full duration of the learning process is essential. Funding practices that support multi-year budgets, align resources appropriately with data requirements, and allow flexibility for data-informed course corrections significantly enhance impact.
- **Mandate:** A clear Mandate promoting transparency and accountability in data usage - including comprehensive data sharing among stakeholders and integration of insights from adjacent sectors like health and welfare - strengthens trust and fosters broader, holistic understanding.

- **Mindset:** Often, data collection in education is approached from perspectives of compliance or competency rather than continuous improvement. Fostering a growth Mindset and co-designing data priorities (rather than imposing them top-down) encourages stakeholders to perceive data not as definitive judgements but as opportunities for learning and innovation.

Carol Dweck, a prominent psychologist known for her extensive research on motivation and mindset, highlights the importance of embracing challenges and ongoing learning as fundamental to growth and development. Her insights underscore the approach advocated by DataDrive2030, emphasising that viewing data as an opportunity rather than a threat enhances continuous improvement and innovation. In her words,

**Love challenges, be intrigued by mistakes,  
enjoy effort, and keep on learning.**



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
